Please be advised that trash, metal and electronics pick-up is suspended in weeks which contain a Town/Village Holiday. Routes for household garbage are 2 days per week and 1 day a week for recycling. Information on your scheduled days can be obtained from the Sanitation Department at 914-670-3200.

## **SANITATION**

Household Garbage will be picked-up twice weekly. All garbage must be set out in containers before 6:00 a.m. on the day of collection, or after 5:00 p.m. the evening before collection.

Trash will be collected each Wednesday, except in weeks when there is a Town holiday, as trash collection is suspended.

Organic yard waste and leaves will be picked-up on the last day of your normally scheduled garbage collection, either Thursday or Friday, following the regularly scheduled garbage collection and must be placed in brown paper bags. Westchester County Guidelines prohibit the collection of organic yard waste in plastic bags. Grass clippings are not accepted and should not be mixed in with acceptable organic yard waste. **Bags or reusable containers which contain grass clippings will not be picked up.**

## **FOOD SCRAP RECYCLING**

**WHY RECYCLE FOOD SCRAPS?** Food scraps are one of the largest components of trash sent to landfills and incinerators. However, food scraps are not trash, they are a resource that can be turned into useful compost. Recycling food scraps into compost captures their nutrients and energy and returns them to the environment. Composting food scraps turns that story around! Instead of wasting energy trying to burn food, or creating methane from landfilling it, composting food scraps produces a useful and valuable product that gives back to our nutrient life cycle resulting in cleaner soil, water and air.

**WHY IS IT IMPORTANT TO FOLLOW THE RULES?** If an item not accepted as part of this program is mixed with the waste, the entire truck load is considered “contaminated”. Contaminated loads are rejected by the composting facility and will be reintroduced into the normal waste stream. ***It is important to not put anything but accepted items in the compost drop off bins.***

### **HERE'S HOW TO DO IT...**

1. **COLLECT** your food scraps in a countertop pail. Although not required, you may line your pail with a compostable bag – please no plastic bags.
2. Most residents will fill the countertop pail with food scraps 3-4 times per week. Therefore, it is suggested that residents also have a larger bin to **TRANSFER** food scraps into for weekly storage. This larger bin can also be used for transportation to the Recycling Center. It is recommended that food storage bins be kept indoors – either in the house or in the garage.
3. **BRING** your transportation bin to the Compost Program Drop Off bins to dispose of your food scraps as often as needed. There is no charge to drop off food scraps.

All material collected is taken by the resident to drop-off location at 55 New King Street, West Harrison.



**ACCEPTED ITEMS:** ALL FOOD, including: fruits and vegetables (remove stickers, bands, ties), meat and poultry (bones are ok), fish and shellfish (shells are ok), dairy products, bread and pasta, rice and grains, egg shells, chips and snacks, nuts and seeds (shells are ok), leftover, spoiled and expired food (cooked is ok), coffee grounds (paper filters are ok), tea bags (remove staples), paper towels, tissues and napkins (colored are ok), wooden chopsticks, popsicle sticks and wine corks, cut flowers, and compostable bags (no plastic bags).

**NOT ACCEPTED ITEMS:** Plastic bags, plastic packaging and wrappers (use only compostable bags, paper bags or no bags), baby/hand wipes, and pet waste.

## **RECYCLING**

**Important Notice to Residents:** On September 1, 1992, the County of Westchester adopted the Source Separation Law. Every municipality is responsible for implementing measures reasonably designed to comply with Westchester County's recycling law. This law requires the separation of certain recyclable materials from the garbage by residents, businesses and institutions. In addition, owners of multiple use homes and apartment buildings, as well as businesses and institutions, must provide an appropriate number of containers to accommodate the separation and storage of recyclables. Every waste generator in Westchester County shall be responsible for the separation of solid waste and recyclables at the point of generation.

As all Harrison residents know, the handling and removal of refuse, garbage and recyclables is an ever-increasing expense to our community. Proper separation of these items is the law. More importantly, efforts toward recycling reduce the amount of garbage that must eventually be placed in landfills. There is a direct dollar savings to the community by reducing expenditures for refuse that should be recycled.

Newspaper, glass, plastic and metal will be collected on the same day. Please check the Recycling Zone section to determine your collection day and zone and the Observed Holidays Section for any change in your collection schedule. All recycling must be set out at the curb in containers before 6:00 a.m. on the day of collection, or after 5:00 p.m. the evening before collection.

**NOTE:** For those residents on an Automated Sanitation route, when household garbage collection and recycling fall on the same day, place the recycle bins to the opposite side of the driveway away from the trash cart.

**Newspaper:** All weekly and daily newspapers, including glossy inserts, magazines, telephone books, brochures, catalogs, junk mail, computer and business paper, envelopes and promotional materials are recyclable. These items should be placed loose in recycle bins, corrugated boxes or brown paper bags. **Plastic bags may not be used to contain these items.**

**Books:** Paperback and hard cover books are **NOT** recyclable and should be placed out on Wednesday with bulk trash.

**Corrugated Cardboard:** All non-wax coated, corrugated boxes which are clean of excessive amounts of tape, metal or plastic and which have been flattened and bundled will be picked up with newspapers. Bundles must not exceed three feet by three feet by one foot, or they will not be



collected.

**Glass:** Food and beverage jars, bottles and containers made of green, brown or clear glass, which has been rinsed with the caps removed, must be placed curbside in a recycle bin. Items placed in plastic or paper bags will not be collected. The following items are prohibited from commingled collection: light bulbs, window and mirror glass, ceramics, pesticide-herbicide bottles and any other non-food or non-beverage containers.

**Plastics:** All plastic containers coded #1 thru #7 used for food, beverages, detergents, shampoo, milk, water, plastic flower pots and soda will be collected. The following items are prohibited for commingled collection: foam plastic materials, including "popcorn" packing material, film plastics, plastic bags, vinyl, 5 gallon plastic pails and pesticide-herbicide containers.

**Metal Containers:** All food and beverage containers made of tin, aluminum and other metals will be collected. The following items are prohibited from commingled collection: aluminum siding, scrap metal, wire, pipes, tubing, motors, sheet metal, water based and oil based paint cans.

**Beverage Cartons:** Recyclable beverage cartons consist predominantly of cardboard and include waxy cartons used for juice and milk; soup and broth; cream; and egg substitutes and should be included with paper and cardboard recyclables.

Please be advised that any recycling that is mixed will be stickered and will not be collected until properly separated and then will be collected on the next scheduled collection day. Recycling is accepted in the standard Town Blue Bins or a recycle container that does NOT exceed 35 gallons.

### **BULK METAL**

The following items are described as bulk metal products: stoves, refrigerators, dishwashers (metal only), washing machines, dryers, hot water heaters, freezers, lawn mowers, air conditioners, plumbing fixtures and other large metal items. Bulk metal products must be free of capacitors and Freon gas and tagged prior to placement at the curb. In addition, all doors must be removed from appliances prior to their placement at the curb for collection. All metals will be picked-up curbside on Wednesday by appointment only. To obtain the names and telephone numbers of firms qualified to perform the draining of Freon, or to schedule a pick-up, please call the Sanitation Department at 914-670-3200, between 9:00 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. on business days. Pick-up of bulk metal is suspended during weeks which contain a Town/Village Holiday. No poles longer than 4 feet long will be collected. In addition, poles must be cleaned for pickup (no cement). ***Please be advised that if your property is serviced by a private carting company, the Sanitation Department will not collect bulk metal from your property.***

### **COMPUTERS, TV AND SMALL ELECTRONICS**

Westchester County has instituted a recycling program for Computers, TV's and small electronic equipment. The following is a list of items that the County has designated as acceptable for recycling: **TV's, cable TV equipment, computer monitors, personal computers, computer printers, keyboards, speakers, laptop computers and peripherals, scanners, modems, stereos and speakers, CD players, tape recorders, fax machines, word processors, typewriters, ballasts from fluorescent lamps, battery operated appliances and power tools, Ni-cad**



batteries, small electric powered motors, household appliances and wiring. As with Bulk Metal, these items will be picked-up by appointment only. To schedule an appointment, please call the Sanitation Dispatcher at 914-670-3200 or the Department of Public Works at 914-670-3100.

### **BULK WASTE AND TRASH**

Bulk waste and trash will be picked-up curbside on Wednesday, except during weeks which contain a Town holiday when pick-up is suspended. Trash must be placed curbside before 6:00 a.m. on the day of collection, or after 5:00 p.m. the evening before collection.

**Bulk waste** includes furniture such as beds, couches, chairs and rugs. Rugs must be cut in no longer than 3 foot lengths and tied in bundles not to exceed 50 pounds. **Trash** includes all items other than household garbage and recyclables. Quantities of trash exceeding 2 cubic yards will be picked-up **by appointment only**. Items that will not be collected include, but are not limited to, chlorine (liquid or tablets), construction debris, building renovation debris, tree stumps, rocks, concrete, bricks, plaster, sheet rock, soil, auto or truck tires, waste substances, car batteries and pesticides. *Contractors are responsible for the removal of their own waste. Please be advised that if your property is serviced by a private carting company, the Sanitation Department will not collect bulk waste or trash from your property.*

**Household Paint:** Both oil-based paint and water-based (latex) paint may legally and safely be disposed of in your garbage by following these simple instructions. Harden paint by mixing kitty litter or another absorbent pellet material, such as Speedy-Dri, in can until no liquid remains. The more absorbent material added the quicker the paint will harden. Air dry the paint and absorbent material until hard. When the paint is hard, place the can with the lid off, at the curb for Wednesday Bulk pick-up.

### **RADIOLOGICAL MEDICATION WASTE**

If anyone in your household is receiving medical treatment involving radioactive materials, all residuals or personal items that would collect bodily fluids should be returned to the hospital or health care facility where treatment was received, for proper disposal. Your doctor will advise you how long after treatment you will need to continue to take these precautions. These items include, but are not limited to: diapers, kitty litter, dog waste bags, feminine hygiene products, tissues or any other product that would be used to absorb bodily fluids. If you have any questions, please call the Westchester County Department of Health at (914) 813-5000.

### **MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS**

**Household Batteries:** Under New York State law, beginning June 8, 2011, retailers that sell rechargeable nickel-cadmium, sealed lead, lithium ion, nickel metal hydride, and dry cell batteries capable of being recharged and battery packs containing any of the mentioned batteries, are required to accept from consumers and recycle these batteries, for free, during normal business hours. Retailers are also required to post signs informing consumers about in-store recycling programs. Starting December 5, 2011, residents of New York State are required by law to recycle these batteries. Knowingly disposing of the above battery types as solid waste will subject violators to fines.

**Vehicle Batteries:** Take vehicle batteries to the retailers that sell them. State law requires such retailers to accept, free of charge, up to two (2) vehicle batteries per person per month. You can also call local scrap metal dealers and ask if they will accept your battery.

**Motor Oil:** Drain motor oil into a clean, unbreakable plastic container with a tight fitting lid, and take it to a service station or retail outlet that sells motor oil. Do not mix oil with any other fluid such as antifreeze, brake fluid or gasoline. State law requires most service stations and retailers to accept, free of charge, up to 5 gallons of motor oil per person per day.

**Oil Filters:** Drain oil from the filter. This should be done when the temperature is above 60 degrees F. Oil drains more easily and thoroughly in warmer temperatures. State law requires most service stations and retailers to accept, free of charge, used oil filters.

**Propane Gas and Barbecue Tanks: 20 Pound Tanks:** These tanks will not be collected by the Town/Village of Harrison. Check your local yellow pages under "Gas- Propane" for a listing of retail outlets that accept these tanks for disposal. **One Pound Tanks** should be emptied of all residual gas through proper use. Empty tanks may be disposed of on Wednesday with the Bulk Metal Pick-Up. Please call 914-670-3200 to schedule an appointment. If your barbecue tank can be refilled, ask a neighbor or friend if he or she can use it.

**Spray Paint:** Cans should be completely void of paint by spraying out all paint until the spray paint can is empty. Once the spray paint can is completely empty, it can be placed in with your household garbage.

Information regarding the removal and disposal of hazardous waste and the schedule of County Household Recycling Days may be obtained by calling the Westchester County Chemical Waste Information Hotline at 914-813-5425. Information regarding the removal of other items may be obtained by consulting the yellow pages under "Rubbish and Garbage Removal."

## LEAVES

### *Fall Leaf Pick-Up - October 28<sup>th</sup> through December 13<sup>th</sup>*

Leaves may be placed loose at the curbside starting on October 28<sup>th</sup> or in brown paper bags, for pick-up after the regularly scheduled Thursday or Friday garbage collection. **No loose curbside leaves will be permitted before October 28<sup>th</sup> or after December 13<sup>th</sup>.** During the week of December 16<sup>th</sup>, the Highway Department will make a final curbside collection of loose leaves in each neighborhood. Do not place leaves in the street as this is a violation of Town Code. Piled leaves in the street pose both a safety hazard and potential for clogging drains. Loose leaves must be segregated from brush piles. Upon completion of loose-leaf pickup, organic yard waste (including leaves) placed in brown paper bags (maximum of ten), and placed at the curb, will continue to be collected by the Sanitation Department on the last day of your normally scheduled garbage collection, either Thursday or Friday, following the regularly scheduled garbage collection.

## LEAF MULCHING

Leaves are a renewable source of nutrients which protect root systems and help keep them moist during hot summer months. Leaf mulching also reduces the need for costly fertilizer and potential hazardous weed killers. Before mulching with your lawn mower, make sure trees are healthy and disease free. Check to make sure your lawn mower is in proper working order and that blades are sharpened. Also, be careful of tree roots, stones, sticks, balls, etc.

**How to mulch leaves with your lawn mower:** Work in one direction, running mower over leaves, blowing cuttings away from tree trunks. Then, work in the opposite direction. Make two or three passes once a week until most of the leaves are chopped. Spread remaining leaves out with a rake, or heap on your compost pile with grass clippings. Do not allow leaf cuttings to accumulate too close to tree trunks.

## GRASS CLIPPINGS

Effective in 2015, the Town will no longer collect grass clippings. We are prohibited from accepting and processing all grass clippings due to a NYC Dept. of Environmental Protection directive. The Town is suggesting that all residents' mulch mow their lawns. Other options to consider should you choose:

- Have the material collected by a private carter.
- Landscapers have the means of finding a site, other than the Town's Transfer Station that may accept grass clippings.

Mixing of grass clippings with acceptable organic materials or household garbage is prohibited.

## BRUSH

Brush, including small twigs, branches and garden plants, must be kept separate from leaves. These items should be cut and bundled in 3 foot lengths with a diameter not to exceed 3 inches and left at the curbside. Logs are not collected by the Town. Curbside brush is picked up once a month from March through December by the Highway Department. Brush should be placed



curbside after 5 pm on the Sunday before the collection week (please refer to the recycling calendar for the brush collection schedule). Once Highway has been to your neighborhood they will not return until the following monthly collection. During the week of December 16<sup>th</sup>, the Highway Department will make a final curbside collection in each neighborhood. **Please do not place brush on the sidewalk or in the roadway.**

### **CHRISTMAS TREES**

Christmas trees may be placed curbside for pick-up from January 2<sup>nd</sup> through January 31<sup>st</sup>. Do not place trees in plastic bags. No roping will be collected.



# WESTCHESTER RECYCLES

Sorting your paper, cardboard and other recyclables is quick and easy. Just focus on tossing all mixed paper into one bin and plastic, glass, and metal into another. Please **EMPTY** and **RINSE** all containers and flatten and break down cardboard boxes.



## TIPS FOR RECYCLING RIGHT!

- Keep it Loose! Don't bag your recyclables.
- All containers are empty, rinsed, & dry
- Place shredded paper in paper bags.
- Cardboard is flattened & broken down

**Q | I heard that some municipalities have been disposing of recyclables as garbage. Is Westchester throwing recyclables in the garbage?**

A | No. Westchester County's Refuse Disposal District recycles all of the recyclables collected curbside. It is important that all recyclable materials are correctly sorted and cleaned.

**Q | Can I recycle all plastics marked #1 - #7?**

A | Yes, Visit <http://environment.westchestergov.com/residents> for more information.

**Q | Can I put my recyclables in plastic bags?**

A | No, keep recyclables unbagged and loose in your recycling container. Plastic bags damage recycling machinery causing facility downtime and also contaminate the recyclables. Plastic bags may be recycled at many large retail outlets.

**Q | Can I recycle caps and lids from containers?**

A | Yes. After rinsing, caps and lids should be reattached.

**Q | Can Styrofoam be recycled?**

A | Contact your local municipality to find out if they have a styrofoam recycling drop-off program. Otherwise place styrofoam in the garbage.

**Q | Can I place small electronics in my recycling bin or TVs and the like at the curb?**

A | Electronics cannot be placed in the garbage. Many municipalities offer a drop-off location for electronics. Some municipalities collect separated electronics curbside. Visit <http://environment.westchestergov.com/recycling/municipal-offices> for more information.

**Q | Can pizza boxes be recycled?**

A | Only clean pizza boxes can be recycled. If the bottom of the box is covered in grease or food, tear it off and recycle only the clean lid.

**Q | Should I place my recyclables at the curb on very windy days or if a storm is forecast?**

A | Recyclables that blow around the neighborhood are litter. Precipitation may reduce the value of paper and cardboard recyclables. Use your good judgment on whether to delay putting out your recyclables for collection.

**Q | Where can I dispose of construction and demolition debris during or after a renovation?**

A | Construction & demolition debris must be handled by your contractor or brought to a private transfer station that is licensed to handle that type of material. Visit <http://www3.westchestergov.com/swc/licensed-private-transfer-stations-and-processing-facilities> for more information.

**Q | Can recyclables that are soiled with food be cleaned and placed in my recycling bin?**

A | Yes, but if you are unable to clean the recyclable material please put it in the garbage.

**Q | Can I place shredded paper in my curbside recycling?**

A | Yes, shredded paper can be included with your curbside recycling. Please put shredded paper in a paper bag and place the bag upright in your recycling container. Remember, recyclables that blow around the neighborhood are litter.

**Q | Where can I get a new/replacement recycling container?**

A | Some municipalities offer recycling containers for their residents. Containers may also be purchased at home improvement stores.























**Q | Why are gable-top and aseptic cartons, like milk cartons, sorted with the commingled recycling? Aren't they made from paper?**

A | Our facility is equipped to process cartons alongside commingled recyclables (glass, plastics and metals) to help keep the paper recyclables as clean and dry as possible.

# Household Material Recovery Facility ("H-MRF")

### What's Accepted

Properly labeled household chemicals, including:

- Most automotive fluids – antifreeze, brake fluid, gasoline (not motor oil)
- Metal, jewelry and furniture polish
- Pesticides, insecticides, herbicides
- Photo and swimming pool chemicals
- Kerosene and other flammable liquids
- Wood preservatives and stains

Other items including:

- Car tires (up to four per household) \*
- Confidential documents for shredding (up to 4 file-size boxes per visit) \*
- Propane and helium tanks \*
- Mercury thermometers, thermostats
- Electronic waste (e.g., computers and peripherals, tv's, cell phones, etc.) \*

- Fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs and tube-shaped fluorescent bulbs) \*
- Refrigerant-containing appliances (e.g., air conditioners, refrigerators and dehumidifiers) \*
- Batteries – auto, rechargeable & button cell (Alkaline and carbon-zinc batteries can be safely discarded with the household trash.) \*
- Expired or unused medications (Can only be delivered, by appointment, on certain days. Visit [www.westchestergov.com/medicationdisposal](http://www.westchestergov.com/medicationdisposal) to view the reservation calendar, which includes designated med take-back days, and book an appointment or call the Recycling HelpLine at (914) 813-5425)
- Fire Extinguishers

### What's NOT Accepted

- Paint - Oil & Latex – harden paint and put it out with the trash. (Note: Rye Brook, Yorktown, and White Plains residents should put out hardened paint on bulk pick-up days.) Paint Hardener can be used to harden a gallon of latex paint in minutes; to harden oil based paint, add absorbent material, such as kitty litter.
- Construction & Demolition Debris – materials from home improvement and construction projects (e.g. drywall, wood, pipes, fixtures, rock, concrete, asbestos tile, shingles & insulation)
- Non-rechargeable alkaline and carbon zinc batteries (e.g. AAA, AA, C, D, 9 Volt, Long Life C&D cells used for toys, radios, appliances, flashlights, etc. - dispose in trash)

- Curbside recyclables (glass, metal, plastic, cardboard and paper products)
- Smoke and fire detectors (dispose in trash)
- Medical waste (except pharmaceuticals)
- Sharps (needles & syringes)
- Compressed oxygen tanks
- Motor oil (take to a services station or motor oil retail outlet)
- Explosives (i.e., fireworks, bullets and flares--call your local police department for instructions)
- Plastic Bags (bring to large retailer)

## WESTCHESTER'S NEW GUIDELINES TO REDUCE SINGLE-USE WASTE

To reduce waste, including plastic waste, Westchester now requires consumers to **ask for the single-use foodware items** they need. This includes when ordering in person, online or through a food delivery app.



-  Customers may request single-use foodware items or condiments individually 
-  Reducing waste can help lower business and consumer costs and improve our environment
-  Businesses may not provide bundled single-use items or items by default 
-  Plastic beverage stirrers or splash sticks are no longer permitted 

No food service establishment will provide single-use foodware or condiment packets to any dine-in or take-away customer unless specifically requested. Items include forks, knives, spoons, chopsticks, cup sleeves, beverage lids and condiment packets or cups.

# FOOD SCRAP RECYCLING PROGRAM

## WHY RECYCLE FOOD SCRAPS?

Food scraps are one of the largest components of trash sent to landfills and incinerators. However, food scraps are not trash, they are a resource that can be turned into useful compost. Recycling food scraps into compost captures their nutrients and energy and returns them to the environment.

Composting food scraps turns that story around! Instead of wasting energy trying to burn food, or creating methane from landfilling it, composting food scraps produces a useful and valuable product that gives back to our nutrient life cycle resulting in cleaner soil, water and air.

## WHAT IS COMPOST?

When purchasing a bag of potting soil or observing our landscaper putting down “dirt” you are using compost. Compost benefits our landscape by maximizing plant growth, preventing soil erosion and mitigating the frequency of water, fertilizer and pesticide use.

By recycling your food scraps you are reducing waste and creating compost – a double win!

## WHY IS IT IMPORTANT TO FOLLOW THE RULES?

If an item not accepted as part of this program is mixed with the waste, the entire truck load is considered “contaminated”. Contaminated loads are rejected by the composting facility and will be reintroduced into the normal waste stream. *It is important to not put anything but accepted items in the compost drop off bins.*



## HERE'S HOW TO DO IT...

1. **COLLECT** your food scraps in a countertop pail. Although not required, you may line your pail with a compostable bag – please no plastic bags.

2. Most residents will fill the countertop pail with food scraps 3-4 times per week. Therefore it is suggested that residents also have a larger bin to TRANSFER food scraps into for weekly storage. This larger bin can also be used for transportation to the Recycling Center. It is recommended that food storage bins be kept indoors – either in the house or in the garage.
3. **BRING** your transportation bin to the Compost Program Drop Off bins to dispose of your food scraps as often as needed. There is no charge to drop off food scraps.

All material collected is brought to a commercial composting facility where it is turned into compost.

## ACCEPTED ITEMS:

ALL FOOD, including: fruits and vegetables (remove stickers, bands, ties), meat and poultry (bones are ok), fish and shellfish (shells are ok), dairy products, bread and pasta, rice and grains, egg shells, chips and snacks, nuts and seeds (shells are ok), leftover, spoiled and expired food (cooked is ok), coffee grounds (paper filters are ok), tea bags (remove staples), paper towels, tissues and napkins (colored are ok), wooden chopsticks, popsicle sticks and wine corks, cut flowers, and compostable bags (no plastic bags).

## NOT ACCEPTED ITEMS:

Plastic bags, plastic packaging and wrappers (use only compostable bags, paper bags or no bags), baby/hand wipes, and pet waste.
